The President's Message

Last week's speaker: Colin Macfarlane AM – Operation Cleft

In 2002, Colin offered \$25,000 to ROMAC via Box Hill RC, for the cardiac surgery and hospitalization of an East Timor girl called Maria. Visiting Maria and her mother at the RCH he was hooked, realising what could be done for children in developing countries.

Previously he had set up The Glencoe Foundation to help disadvantaged people throughout the world. This year Colin was made a Member of the Order of Australia for his philanthropy.

In 2005, Colin joined Box Hill Central RC, and set up Operation Cleft, as an international project of this club - similar to Operation Smile run by American Rotarians.

He showed pictures of children from various countries. Because these children had disfiguring cleft lips and/or cleft palates, they would be hidden, unable to go to school or to live normal lives. He then showed us pictures of

the same children with the clefts repaired, looking virtually normal.

Operation Cleft raises money to pay local doctors to do this corrective surgery. A cleft lip repair is \$150, and this procedure gives the patient a normal life. Repairs to cleft palates, of course, cost more, but are still performed by local doctors.

All money raised goes to paying for these procedures and any admin costs are covered by the Glencoe Foundation. Colin explained that most of the donations he receives are from individual Rotarians, rather than Rotary Clubs which have various

other projects on the go. His very professional presentation worked and several individual Richmond Rotarians committed to funding at least a cleft lip repair. (Pictures: Arif before and after surgery)

Rotary Youth Arts Project (RYAP)
Report by Tim Baker. RYAP's target group for participants is disadvantaged young people with an average age of 15 years (a range from 12 to 17 years) who live in the high rise estates within the City of Yarra.

We set out in 2007 to have 50 young people complete a 20 week experience by participating in Dance, Circus and Photography. About 180 young people were initially involved in one of these three activities when they participated in the pre-project "taster sessions" conducted in five "alternative" schools throughout the City of Yarra. The "tasters" explained the project to the students and raised their interest so they would commit to the discipline of attending the 20 sessions. The young people came from a range of diverse cultures, including Somalia, Ivory Coast, China, Vietnam, Jamaica and of course Australia. Some had only recently arrived in our country and many have had frightening experiences and been economically deprived. More than 50 young people commenced the

project and 40 completed the 20 sessions. Many gained enough skill and confidence to perform before an audience or exhibit their photographic artwork.

Most of these young people have crystallized their interest in the chosen art form and are keen to continue in the 2008 project. A number of older students are keen to take a NEXT STEP and develop their careers in Dance, Photography and Business. This is the key objective of the project - the development of a sense of purpose.

ROMAC Report John Bengner passed on a series of reports from last Wednesday regarding Babu, a boy from Bangladesh, who is in Melbourne to have reconstructive surgery. The operation was last Wednesday and took 11 hours.

Babu had a benign tumour on his jaw that had eaten away part of the jaw bone. Because he is growing, the replacement jaw bone had to be growing tissue. Surgeon Prof Andrew Heggie firstly removed bone and tissue from other parts of Babu's body to create the new jaw, and then had to operate to correct the face that had previously had a large growth. Assisting in the operation was Asst Prof Biduel Alam from Bangladesh who is here with Babu and will take back to Bangladesh the expertise related to this operation. Babu and his father were escorted to the hospital by a new ROMAC Committee Member, David Gibbs, who waited at the RCH until Babu was back in the ICU.

By 7 pm Abu was in ICU and had progressed surprisingly well after such a huge operation. ICU staff expected that by later that evening (**cont p4**)

ROMAC (Cont) Babu would be back in the ward. He was communicating verbally with his father - with some difficulty - but it meant so much to his dad. He even asked his father when were they going to take the bone off his hip, so that couldn't have been giving him too much trouble. On leaving, David wished him well: Babu raised his arm, giving David a high five. David reckons "this kid's got guts."

David Barnes, also of ROMAC, says we have a number of "before, during operation and after" shots that will later be edited for a story on TV. There was, he said, an amusing incident on Wednesday morning. The surgeon travelling with Babu, Biduel Alam, told him they couldn't get anything to eat for breakfast that morning, so they

went to 7/11 and bought some bread. Biduel said it was all in pieces: David thinks he had never bought sliced bread before.

David Barnes suggests it would be nice if we could have some ROMAC people and Rotary members to visit in next few days, if only for a few minutes, to let them know we care. "Please make an effort to see Babu," he says, "You will find it most rewarding."
